



A Bear Called Paddington **Michael Bond**


A Lion in the Meadow **Margaret Mahy**


Avocado Baby **John Burningham**


Cops and Robbers **Allan Ahlberg**


Fungus the Bogeyman


Lost and Found


Man on the Moon


Mister Magnolia


My Cat Likes to Hide in Boxes


Oh No, George!


The Berenstain Bears and the Spooky Old Tree


**The Cat in the Hat


**The Dark


**The Django


**The Emperor of Absurdia


The Gruffalo


The Hodgeheg


The Owl Who Was Afraid of the Dark


There Are Cats in This Book


Three by the Sea


Traction Man Is Here


Where the Wild Things Are Maurice Sendak


Beaver Towers or The Witch's Revenge Nigel Hinton


Beegu Alexis Deacon


Claude at the Circus Alex T. Smith


