4. Who is Sycorax? How did Prospero gain power and ownership of the island when he arrived?
5. What happens on page 17 when Prospero snaps his fingers?

1. How does Caliban feel towards Prospero?
2. Why do you think Caliban has a 'cunning smile' on page 17?
3. What are your first impressions of Caliban?
4. In the play, when he is arguing with Prospero, Caliban says: "You taught me language, and my profit on 't Is, I know how to curse. The red plague rid you For learning me your language!" What might he mean by this? Explain.
5. Prospero is a bully. Do you agree? Disagree? Use evidence from the text to support your ideas. Explain.

How might the story have changed if Prospero hadn't have taken Sycorax's magic books?
