Dear Parents and Carers

The Sacred Heart of Jesus & The Immaculate Heart of Mary

During the Month of June the Church celebrates two special Feast Days. The Feasts of the Sacred Heart of Jesus and the Immaculate Heart of Mary. It would be lovely if you could research these wonderful feast days with your children. I have attached a heart craft activity to the newsletter, which you could make, while you share the significance with them.

The Sacred Heart (also known as the Sacred Heart of Jesus) has one of the deepest meanings in the Roman Catholic practice. The symbol represents Jesus Christ's actual heart as His love for all of humanity. The heart of Jesus is viewed as a symbol of "God's boundless and passionate love for mankind". His heart is surrounded by a flame or light, which signifies the divine light of love.



The Immaculate Heart of Mary is a devotional name used to refer to the interior life of the Blessed Virgin Mary, her joys and sorrows, her virtues and hidden perfections, and above all, her love for God the Father, her maternal love for her son Jesus, and her compassionate love for all people. Her heart is typically on fire, which emphasizes the intensity of her love for God and for humanity.

Instruction to make a Sacred Heart of Jesus or Immaculate Heart of Mary.

When completed, you could add to your heart by drawing the other symbols of the cross, fire, Crown of Thorns, flowers and sword and sticking them on to make them more like the heart symbols.




Using an A4 piece of card cut out two identical oval shapes, length ways on the card.



Step 2: Cut

Cut out the long, oval-shaped pattern pieces. Each heart requires two pattern pieces: one red (or pink) and one white.





Fold each pattern piece in half end-to-end. Be sure that the three centre lines are on the outside.

Step 4: Cut on Lines



Hold the folded pattern piece firmly and cut on each of the three lines. Repeat for each pattern piece. If you printed on coloured paper, refold the pattern piece the opposite way so that the printed lines are on the inside.

Step 5: Weave

The weaving can be tricky, so read the instructions carefully and refer to the illustration.



Hold the folded red pattern piece in your left hand and the white one in your right hand. Weave the first loop of the white piece inside the first loop of the red piece. Weave it over the second loop of the red piece, inside the third red loop, and over the fourth.

Weave the second loop of the white piece over the first loop of the red piece. Weave it inside the second red loop, over the third, and inside the fourth.

Weave the third white loop like the first and the fourth like the second. When you are done, the heart will look like the illustration and you will be able to open it up.
